1:30PM - 3:00PM SEX, DRUGS, AND ROLLING WALKERS

As the long-term-care industry faces major challenges in regulation, finance, and staffing, the shift in demographics to a younger, more complex, transient population has added another layer of stress. Resources to develop the type of care and service needed to address issues of long-standing-mental disorders, substance use, addictions, and other behavioral-health needs are in short supply. This session offers a variety of ideas for anticipating and developing common-sense approaches to these contemporary challenges.

SPEAKER: BARBARA SPEEDLING

Barbara Speedling, a quality-of-life specialist, provides education, training and support to long-term-care providers in the development of programs and services to meet the needs of individuals with dementia, mental disorders, brain injury, and complex psychosocial needs. In 2014, she authored, "Why is Grandma Screaming?" a guide to improving the quality of life for the elderly. She is a master trainer for the OASIS dementia education program.

4:00PM - 5:30PM EMR AND EDISCOVERY

With the push toward interoperability, electronic medical records have become ubiquitous in the delivery of skilled-nursing care. While the burgeoning use of eMRs holds great promise, it also presents new challenges that can be traps for the unwary. The upsurge in the use of electronic discovery in litigation intensifies the risks. This session identifies the potential pitfalls and describes the new rules of the road. It identifies the key features of eMRs that distinguish them from paper records and explains how these features are transforming not only the delivery of healthcare, but also the protocols for maintaining privacy and asserting privilege. It examines best practices for the development and maintenance of digital information. It also suggests strategies to safeguard digital data from prying eyes, whether through inadvertent oversight, deliberate overreaching, or malicious cyber-theft.

SPEAKER: JANE BELLO-BURKE, ESQ.

Jane regularly counsels hospital, nursing-home (SNF), assisted-living-facility (ALR and ALP), continuing-care-retirement community (CCRC), and home-care agency (CHHA and LHCSA) providers, as well as social-services agencies and individual practitioners, in meeting their regulatory obligations. She focuses on operational, regulatory, reimbursement, and compliance issues. A seasoned litigator, Jane also represents healthcare providers in federal and state litigation, including Article 78 proceedings, and administrative hearings before the Health and Human Services Departmental Appeals Board (DAB), and the Provider Reimbursement Review Board (PRRB). In addition, she guides providers in the implementation and operation of effective compliance programs and represents them in Medicaid audits, investigations, and appeals.

8:30AM - 10:00AM EFFECTIVELY IDENTIFYING AND ADDRESSING KEY CHANGES IN LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT LAW

With the unprecedented change and uncertainty in the area of labor and employment law, it has become increasing difficult to effectively manage healthcare workforces. During this 90-minute program, Mike will examine a number of significant changes at the federal and state level that require operators to re-assess their handling of employees, workplace policies and labor relations priorities.

11:00AM - 12:30PM CMS FINAL RULE PHARMACY SERVICES UPDATE: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW!

In this session, Dr. Hallett will review the recently released update of the "State Operations Manual Appendix PP," which was implemented in CMS's Phase 2 rollout of the regulatory reform of the Medicare and Medicaid Requirements for Participation Final Rule. He will specifically highlight important aspects of the Guidance to Surveyors in the newly renumbered F-Tags for Pharmacy, as well as touch on the role of the consultant pharmacist in antibiotic stewardship as highlighted in the guidance document.

SPEAKER: DR. WILLIAM HALLETT, Pharm. D, MBA

Dr. Hallett founded Guardian Consulting Services, Inc., which is dedicated to providing consultant pharmacist services to nursing homes, adult-day programs, assisted-living facilities, and group homes for the disabled. His company currently provides clinical-consultant pharmacist services for more than 40,000 patients in over 250 healthcare facilities and programs throughout the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic.

1:30PM - 3:00PM NYSHFA AND LEGAL UPDATES

New York's healthcare administrators are facing a number of legal, legislative, and regulatory issues that could directly impact their ability to deliver high-quality, cost-effective, long-term care throughout the state. This session will shed light on the key legal, legislative, and regulatory issues facing providers and examine their practical operational implications as well as their impact on the delivery of care.

SPEAKERS: STEPHEN B. HANSE, CORNELIUS D. MURRAY, AND DANIEL HIEM

Stephen B. Hanse serves as vice president of governmental affairs & counsel for the New York State Health Facilities Association ("NYSHFA") and the New York State Center for Assisted Living ("NYSCAL"). Prior to joining NYSHFA/NYSCAL in early 2013, Stephen was with the firm of Featherston, Haugh, Wiley & Clyne, LLP in Albany, New York where he represented numerous Fortune 500 companies, healthcare organizations and healthcare providers and professionals before New York's Executive, Legislative and Judicial branches of government.

Cornelius D. Murray is a senior partner in the law firm of O'Connell and Aronowitz, in Albany, New York. He is a member of the firm's Health Law practice and supervising partner of its Appellate Law, Constitutional Law, and Indian Gaming practices. He has represented many clients in the healthcare industry and is currently general counsel for the New York State Health Facilities Association where he focuses on issues involving complex Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement issues, regulatory compliance and certificates of need.

Dan Heim is executive vice president of LeadingAge New York (formerly the New York Association of Homes and Services for the Aging). He oversees the association's public-policy efforts including policy development, regulatory affairs, member communications, and litigation activities. LeadingAge New York represents nearly 500 notfor-profit and governmental providers of seniorliving services throughout the state.

4:00PM - 5:30PM MEDICARE REIMBURSEMENT UPDATE: RCS-I

The new Medicare Part A payment system is targeted for implementation on October 1, 2018. This is not a "refinement" as we've experienced in the past. The Resident Classification System adds significant complexity, with five distinct payment domains including a diagnosis-driven therapy component and length-of-stay-weighted per diem rates. Mastering the system will require facilitywide changes in care management and documenta-

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tion. This program will provide early insight into the most significant payment reform in 20 years. Presenters will also review new regulations specific to the MDS, SNF value-based purchasing, alternative-payment models and reimbursement penalties.

SPEAKERS: SHERYL ROSENFIELD, RN AND MARC ZIMMET

Shervl Rosenfield has been active in the national SNF community for over 30 years. She is a member of the Health Care Compliance Association's Long-Term-Care Committee, working with representatives throughout the United States on protocols and policies effecting medical review and payment concerns. As a trainer of the MDS since 1990, she was a founder of AANAC, a national organization serving over 15,000 members associated with the assessment and care processes in skilled-nursing facilities. Sheryl has worked with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) on multiple projects, including serving on the Technical Expert Panel to evaluate the implementation and impact of the RUG PPS on SNFs. She was a member of the clinical-standards-and-training team for the federal DAVE project and served as a Data Monitor for the federal STRIVE project. She also served as an "MDS 3.0 Manual" reviewer and continues to contribute to that project.

Marc Zimmet entered the skilled-nursing industry in 1993, at the onset of the national "sub-acute" care movement. Medicare cost-report appeals were a key component of a successful short-term rehabilitation program, and Zimmet & Company (the precursor to ZHSG) quickly emerged as a national leader in the space. As skilled-nursing facilities transitioned to prospective payment in the late 1990's, Mr. Zimmet applied his experience from New York State's participation in the Nursing Home Case-Mix & Quality Demonstration project to develop early reimbursement-compliance-management strategies for his clients. He now leads the even more challenging transition to valuebased/alternative-payment and managed care.

Recognizing the market and regulatory changes transforming the healthcare landscape, Marc structured the firm's "Advanced Healthcare Initiatives" program in 2015. His vision has been realized through the four Zimmet Healthcare "spectrum" companies, establishing the firm as a leader in SNF data analytics, care management/transitions technology and outsourced case management.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 14, 2018

8:15AM – 9:45AM IMPROVING FINANCIAL AND CLINICAL OUT-COMES WITH INTEGRATED BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Successful integration of behavioral-health services has become indispensable to survival in the

SNF environment. Achieving outstanding shortterm rehabilitation outcomes, avoiding rehospitalizations and staying in compliance with the regulation of psychotropics all require state-of-the-art psychiatric and psychological care woven into overall medical care.

The appropriate management of psychiatric concerns with evidence-based treatment has always been essential to a facility's ability to operate within the regulatory environment while maintaining an attractive climate for residents, families and staff. But modern SNFs are confronted by new imperatives that require fundamental shifts in care in order to avoid potentially devastating consequences.

Case studies and clinical presentations will highlight effective strategies for implementing evidence-based GDRs, non-pharmacologic interventions for managing difficult behaviors, clinical protocols for avoiding re-hospitalizations, and other essential ideas for succeeding in the current regulatory and financial landscape.

SPEAKER: DR. RICHARD JUMAN

Dr. Richard Juman is a licensed clinical psychologist and the national director of psychological services for TeamHealth, which provides integrated medical, psychiatric and psychological services in thousands of post-acute and acute facilities in the U.S. He is an expert in the psychotherapeutic and behavioral treatment models utilized in post-acute care. Dr. Juman lectures on a variety of issues pertaining to the populations found in postacute care as well as on specific problems of aging.

Shelly Glock is the deputy director, Division of Nursing Homes and ICF/IID Surveillance, NYS-DOH. Ms. Glock is a LNHA and brings a variety of experience with her to this position. Most recently she held the position of quality improvement specialist with IPRO's Care Transitions project team under the CMS 10th Scope of Work. She was responsible for the design, implementation and evaluation of community-care-transition initiatives to decrease unnecessary hospitalizations and improve the experience of Medicare beneficiaries and caregivers as they transition across healthcare settings.
